2. **countable, uncountable** the pleasant smell of a type of food or drink, especially of wine
 - a red wine with a full flavour and a fragrant bouquet

Word Origin:

early 18th cent.: from French (earlier clump of trees), from a dialect variant of Old French **bos** 'wood'. Sense 2 dates from the mid 19th cent.

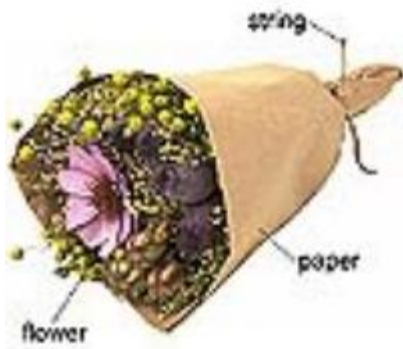
