Word Origin:

[**congested**] late Middle English (as *congest* in the sense 'heap up, accumulate'): from Latin *congerere* 'heap up', from *con-* 'together' + *gerere* 'bring'.

Example Bank:

- The roads to Bordeaux were heavily congested.
- controllers trying to manage increasingly congested airports
- one of the nation's most chronically congested airports
- Many of Europe's airports are heavily congested.
- Traffic engineers believe that the new road could free up congested city streets.
