Word Origin:

late Middle English (as a verb in the sense 'diminish (a sum or amount)': from Anglo-Norman French *rebatre* 'beat back', also 'deduct'.

Example Bank:

- She's claiming a 100% tax rebate.
- The maximum cash rebate available is about \$4 800.
- rebates on the new council tax
- You may be entitled to a rebate on your car insurance.
