Word Origin:

Middle English (in the general sense 'lodging, place to stay') : from Old French, from medieval Latin *hospitale*, neuter of Latin *hospitalis* 'hospitable', from *hospes*, *hospit-* 'host, guest'.

Example Bank:

- We stayed at a student hostel during the conference.
- We stayed at a youth hostel in Perugia.
- a probation hostel for young offenders
- homeless families staying in bed and breakfast hostels
- All we could afford was dormitory-style accommodation at a hostel.
- Hostel accommodation is provided for the seasonal workers.
- Hostels in the city cost about \$10 a night.
- The building had been used as a student hostel.
- There were several backpacker hostels in that part of the town.
- They were on a walking tour, staying in youth hostels.
- a youth/student hostel
