[rɪˈdempʃ(ə)n] *n*

1. 1) выкуп; освобождение от залогового обременения, погашение  
 redemption price - *фин.* выкупная цена, выкупной курс  
 redemption fund - *фин.* фонд погашения  
 right of redemption - право выкупа
- 2) обратная покупка
2. возвращение (себе), получение обратно
3. выполнение (*обещания, обязательства*)
4. исправление  
 past /beyond/ redemption - без надежды на исправление, окончательно погибший  
 the redemption of a criminal - исправление /перевоспитание/ преступника
5. 1) спасение, освобождение, избавление  
 suffering proved his redemption - страдания были ему во спасение
- 2) искупление (*вины, греха*)
- 3) *рел.* искупление людских грехов Христом  
 in the Year of our Redemption 1439 - в 1439 году от рождества Христова
6. *эвф.*
- 1) покупка (*титула*); приобретение (*привилегии и т. п.*)
- 2) вступительный взнос (*в привилегированный клуб и т. п.*)

### Word Origin:

late Middle English: from Old French, from Latin *redemptio(n)*, from *redimere* 'buy back', from *re-* 'back' + *emere* 'buy'.

- A charge is payable on redemption.
- After another incident at the weekend, the club's reputation for violence is beyond redemption.
- She believes that humanity is in need of redemption.
- There is a fee for early redemption.
- Washington journalism is corrupt beyond redemption.
