 - Cook the fruit gently until it forms a pulp.
 - Mash the beans to a pulp.
 - His face had been **beaten to a pulp** (= very badly beaten) .
2. **uncountable** a soft substance that is made by crushing wood, cloth or other material and then used to make paper
 - **paper/wood pulp**
3. **uncountable** the soft part inside some fruit and vegetables

1. **SOFT SUBSTANCE** [singular, uncountable] a very soft substance that is almost liquid, made by crushing plants, wood, vegetables etc:

- Mash the bananas to a pulp.
- timber grown for wood pulp (=used for making paper)
- a soft pulp of leaves and mud

2. **FRUIT/VEGETABLE** [uncountable] the soft inside part of a fruit or vegetable:

- Halve the melon and scoop out the pulp.

3. **BOOKS/FILMS ETC** [uncountable] *American English* books, magazines, films etc that are badly written and that contain lots of sex, violence etc:

- an ad in a pulp magazine
- pulp fiction

4. **beat somebody to a pulp** *informal* to seriously injure someone by hitting them many times

5. **TOOTH** [uncountable] part of the inside of a tooth

—**pulpy** *adjective*:

- Cook slowly until soft and pulpy.
