Word Origin:

late Middle English (as a legal term): from Anglo-Norman French, past participle (used as a noun) of Old French **desmettre** 'dismiss', (in reflexive) 'abdicate', based on Latin **dimittere** (see ↑dismiss).

Example Bank:

- He praised the union's aims but predicted its early demise.
- The war brought about the industry's sudden demise.
- the demise of the USSR
- the events which contributed to his political demise
