to hit on the rebound - ударить рикошетом

    - 2) реакция, разочарование, депрессия (*после неудачи*)

1. **intransitive** ~ (**from/off sth**) to **↑bounce** back after hitting sth  
• The ball rebounded from the goalpost and Podolski headed it in.
2. **intransitive** ~ (**on sb**) (*formal*) if sth that you do rebounds on you, it has an unpleasant effect on you, especially when the effect was intended for sb else  
**Syn:** ↑backfire
3. **intransitive** (*business*) (*of prices, etc.*) to rise again after they have fallen  
**Syn:** ↑bounce back  
• Share prices rebounded after Friday's losses.

**noun** *BrE* ['rɪbaʊnɪ] <sup>1</sup> ; *NAme* ['rɪbaʊnɪ] <sup>1</sup>

1. (*sport*) a ball that hits sth and **↑bounces** back  
• Podolski headed the rebound into the net.
2. (in **↑basketball**) the act of catching the ball after a player has thrown it at the **↑basket** and has not scored a point

3. (business) a positive reaction that happens after sth negative  
• There are signs of an economic rebound.

late Middle English: from Old French *rebondir*, from *re-* 'back' + *bondir* 'bounce up'.

1. [intransitive] if a ball or other moving object rebounds, it moves quickly back away from something it has just hit ⇒ **ricochet**  
**rebound off**  
His shot on goal rebounded off the post.
2. [intransitive] if prices, values etc rebound, they increase again after decreasing **SYN recover**:  
Share prices rebounded today after last week's losses.
3. [intransitive and transitive] to catch a **↑basketball** after a player has tried but failed to get a point  
**rebound on/upon somebody** *phrasal verb*  
if something bad or unpleasant you have done rebounds on you, it has a bad effect on you **SYN backfire**

II. **rebound**<sup>2</sup> /ˈrɪbaʊnd/ *BrE* <sup>ˈ</sup> *AmE* <sup>ˈ</sup> *noun*

1. **on the rebound**

- a) someone who is on the rebound is upset or confused because their romantic relationship has just ended:  
He first met me when I was on the rebound, after splitting up with Mark.
- b) a ball that is on the rebound has just hit something and is moving back through the air:  
I caught the ball on the rebound.
- c) something that is on the rebound is starting to increase or improve again:  
The market seems to be on the rebound.

2. [countable] **technical** an act of catching a **↑basketball** after a player has tried but failed to get a point
