## 1. [ˌprɒməˈneɪd] n

- прогулка, гулянье; катанье
- место для гулянья, променада (*особ.* набережная, проспект, бульвар, аллея, палуба корабля и т. п.)  
promenade deck - верхняя /прогулочная/ палуба  
promenade concert - «променадный концерт» (классической музыки; первонач. публика во время концерта могла прогуливаться по залу)
- амер.* студенческий или школьный бал
- прогулка, катанье (на лодке, катере, теплоходе)

- гулять, разгуливать, прогуливаться  
to promenade in the streets - гулять по улицам  
to promenade about - прогуливаться  
to promenade the deck - прогуливаться по палубе

### noun

- (also informal **prom**) (both BrE, becoming old-fashioned) a public place for walking, usually a wide path beside the sea  
• the promenade at Blackpool
- (old-fashioned) a walk that you take for pleasure or exercise, especially by the sea, in a public park, etc.

### Word Origin:

mid 16th cent. (denoting a leisurely walk in public): from French, from **se promener** 'to walk', reflexive of **promener** 'take for a walk'.

### Example Bank:

- They walked along the promenade.
- a hotel on the promenade

to walk up and down in a relaxed way, by the sea, in a public park, etc.
