[**vulgar vulgarly**] late Middle English: from Latin *vulgaris*, from *vulgus* 'common people'. The original senses were 'used in ordinary calculations' (surviving in ↑vulgar fraction) and 'in ordinary use, used by the people' (surviving in vulgar tongue).
