1. in which there is a lot of sudden change, confusion, disagreement and sometimes violence
 - a short and turbulent career in politics
 - a turbulent part of the world
 - turbulent emotions
2. (*of air or water*) changing direction suddenly and violently
 - The aircraft is designed to withstand turbulent conditions.
 - a **turbulent sea/storm** (= caused by ↑turbulent water/air)
3. (*of people*) noisy and/or difficult to control
