- ~ (with sb/sth) (for sth) a fierce rivalry for world supremacy
- ~ (between A and B) (for sth) There is a certain amount of friendly rivalry between the teams.
- political rivalries
- sibling rivalry (= between brothers and sisters)

Example Bank:

- rivalry between the army and the police
- rivalry for the party leadership
- rivalry over who is to head the delegation
- rivalry with foreign companies
- the bitter rivalry that existed between them
- the fiercest rivalry in professional sports
- the increasing rivalry among competitors in the industry
- Her parents had been very aware of the problems of sibling rivalry before the younger child was born.
- The coup attempt sharpened old political rivalries.
- They are locked in a fierce rivalry for world supremacy.
