- (informal) a child's word for a little bird
- (in ↑golf) a score of one stroke less than ↑par (= the standard score for a hole)  
**compare** ↑bogey, ↑eagle
- (NAmE) = ↑shuttlecock

Word Origin:

late 18th cent.: diminutive of ↑bird; the golf term from US slang bird, denoting any first-rate thing.

- in golf, to get the ball into the hole in one hit less than ↑par:  
Woods birdied the last two holes.
