Derived Word ↑*gruesomely*Word Origin:[**gruesome gruesomely**] late 16th cent.: from Scots *grue* 'to feel horror, shudder' (of Scandinavian origin) + ↑*-some*. Rare before the late 18th cent., the word was popularized by Sir Walter Scott.Example Bank:
