- The captain stood to attention and saluted smartly.

noun

- 1. countable** the action of raising your right hand to the side of your head as a sign of respect, especially between soldiers and officers
  - He returned the salute as he passed the line of guards.
- 2. countable, uncountable** a thing that you say or do to show your admiration or respect for sb/sth or to welcome sb
  - He raised his hat as a friendly salute.
  - His first words were a salute to the people of South Africa.
  - They all raised their glasses **in salute** .
  - The occasion was organized as a salute to a century of change.
- 3. countable** an official occasion when guns are fired into the air to show respect for an important person
  - a 21-gun salute

**2. [uncountable and countable]** something that expresses praise to someone for something they have achieved, or that expresses honour or respect to someone or something

ˈ Everyone at the table raised their glasses in salute.
