a small platform in a church that is like a box and is high above the ground, where a priest, etc. stands to speak to the people  
(*figurative*) The policy has been widely condemned from the pulpit (= by priests and other church leaders) .

Word Origin:

Middle English: from Latin *pulpitum* 'scaffold, platform', in medieval Latin 'pulpit' .

Example Bank:

- As soon as he mounted the pulpit half of the congregation usually left the church.
- The policy has been widely condemned from the pulpit.
