- 1.** (of a disease or medical condition) existing since or before birth
 - congenital abnormalities
 - Half of all fetuses with the syndrome have a congenital heart defect.
- 2.** **only before noun** existing as part of a person's character and not likely to change
 - a congenital inability to tell the truth
- 3.** **only before noun** (of a person) born with a particular illness: (**figurative**) a congenital liar (= one who will not change)

Derived Word ↑**congenitally**Word Origin:[**congenital congenitally**] late 18th cent.: from Latin **congenitus**, from **con-** 'together' + **genitus** (past participle of **gignere** 'beget') + ↑-al.Example Bank:
