the intrusion of one's opinion upon another - навязывание кому-л. своего мнения
- 2) *шотл. церк.* навязывание прихожанам неугодного им священника
3. *геол.* интрузия магмы; внедрение (*соли, изверженного материала и т. п.*)
4. *юр.* неправомерный захват недвижимости

1. something that affects a situation or people's lives in a way that they do not want
  - ~ **(on/upon sth)** They claim the noise from the new airport is an intrusion on their lives.
  - ~ **(into sth)** This was another example of press intrusion into the affairs of the royals.
2. ~ **(into/on/upon sth)** (*formal*) the act of entering a place which is private or where you may not be wanted
  - She apologized for the intrusion but said she had an urgent message.

Word Origin:

late Middle English (in the sense 'invasion, usurpation'): from medieval Latin *intrusio(n)-*, from Latin *intrudere* 'thrust in', from *in-* 'into' + *trudere* 'to thrust'.

- I really resented his intrusion in a family matter.
- This is a governmental intrusion on the freedom of the press.
- an unwarranted intrusion upon the singer's privacy
- media intrusion into the lives of celebrities
