Word Origin:

early 17th cent. (in the sense 'express approval'): from Latin **acclamare**, from **ad-** 'to' + **clamare** 'to shout'. The change in the ending was due to association with **claim**. Current senses date from the 17th cent.

- This book has been widely acclaimed as a modern classic.
- Mario Vargas Llosa, the internationally acclaimed novelist

noun uncountable

praise and approval for sb/sth, especially an artistic achievement

- **international /popular/critical acclaim**

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Example Bank:

- His discoveries earned him wide acclaim.
- She received international acclaim for her interpretation of Chopin.
- The play opened last week to universal acclaim.
- acclaim from the critics
- Her latest novel has received widespread critical acclaim.

II. **acclaim** ² BrE ² AmE ² *noun* [uncountable]

praise for a person or their achievements:

The young singer is enjoying critical acclaim (=praise by people who are paid to give their opinion on art, music etc).

Their recordings have won great acclaim.
