  - 2) 1) наполнять до отказа, переполнять  
2) заваливать (*товарами*)  
to glut the market - завалить рынок товарами  
the prices for wheat dropped when the market was glutted with it - цены на пшеницу упали, когда её оказалось слишком много на рынке
