1. (of an electronic process) using a continuously changing range of physical quantities to measure or store data
  - an **analogue circuit/computer/signal**
2. (BrE also **ana·log**) (of a clock or watch) showing the time using hands on a <sup>↑</sup>dial and not with a display of numbers
  - compare <sup>↑</sup>digital

a thing that is similar to another thing

1. **analogue clock/watch** a clock or watch that uses <sup>↑</sup>pointers, not changing numbers ⇒ **digital**
2. *technical* analogue technology uses changing physical quantities such as <sup>↑</sup>voltage to store data ⇒ **digital**
