  - The car skidded and overturned
  - ~ sth He stood up quickly, overturning his chair.
2. **transitive** ~ sth to officially decide that a legal decision, etc. is not correct, and to make it no longer valid
  - to **overturn a decision/conviction/verdict**
  - His sentence was overturned by the appeal court.

  - His conviction was overturned by the Court of Appeal.
3. [**transitive**] to suddenly remove a government from power, especially by using violence **SYN overthrow**
