Syn: ↑unharmed

- The hostages **emerged** from their ordeal **unscathed** .

Example Bank:

- The children escaped unscathed.
- The company came through the crisis apparently unscathed.
- The old town was left unscathed by the riots.
- Not many European cities survived the war unscathed.
- One or two of the survivors were relatively unscathed.
- The hostages emerged from their ordeal unscathed.

unscathed

not injured or harmed by something

escape/emerge unscathed

- He escaped unscathed from the accident.
- The government was relatively unscathed by the scandal.

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THESAURUS■ **not harmed or damaged**

- **safe** not harmed or damaged: The children are all safe.
- **OK/all right** *informal* safe and not hurt: I was glad to hear that you were OK.
- **unharmed** not hurt: The kidnappers released the young man unharmed.
- **unscathed** /ʌnˈskeɪðd/ not hurt or damaged, after an accident, an attack, or a dangerous experience – used when you are surprised by this: The baby escaped unscathed. | Miraculously, the old part of the city remained unscathed.
- **in one piece** *informal* not harmed or damaged, especially after a journey or a dangerous experience: I'm glad you're home in one piece.
- **out of danger** safe, after being in a dangerous situation: As soon as they were out of danger, they stopped for a rest. | His doctors say he is out of danger.
