 - He lay inert with half-closed eyes.
 - The president has to operate within an inert political system.
- (*chemistry*) without active chemical or other properties (= characteristics)

Word Origin:[**inert**] mid 17th cent.: from Latin *iners*, *inert-* 'unskilled, inactive', from *in-* (expressing negation) + *ars*, *art-* 'skill, art'.Example Bank:

- chemically inert radioactive waste
- I felt sleepy and inert.
- They dragged the inert body out of the river.
