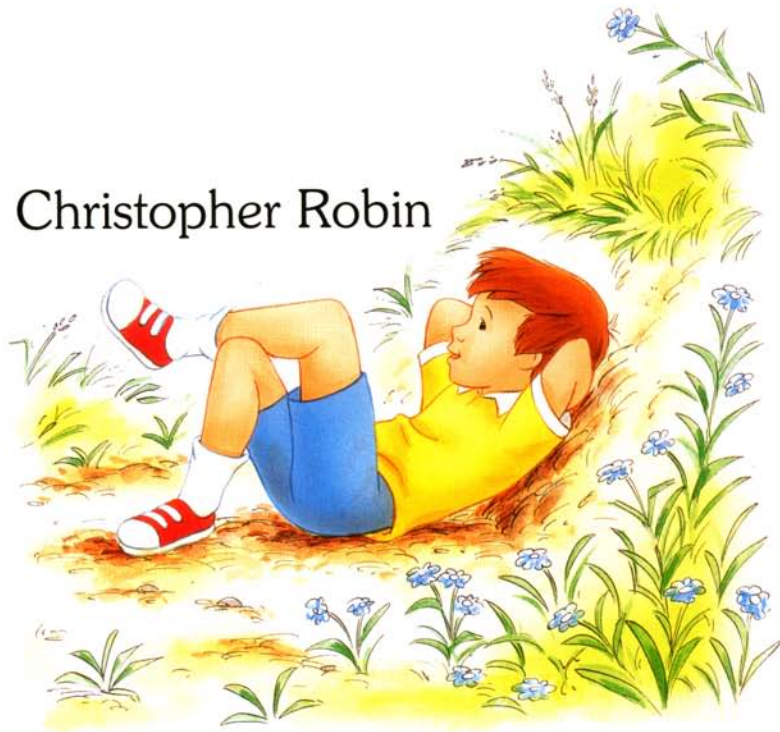

The honey bee went into the wood. And Pooh went into the wood, too.

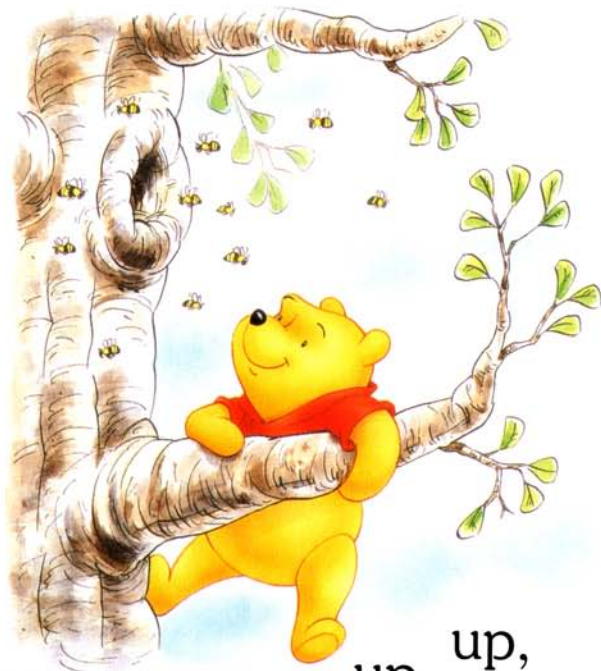


The honey bee went down the path. And Pooh went down the path, too.

He got some honey.

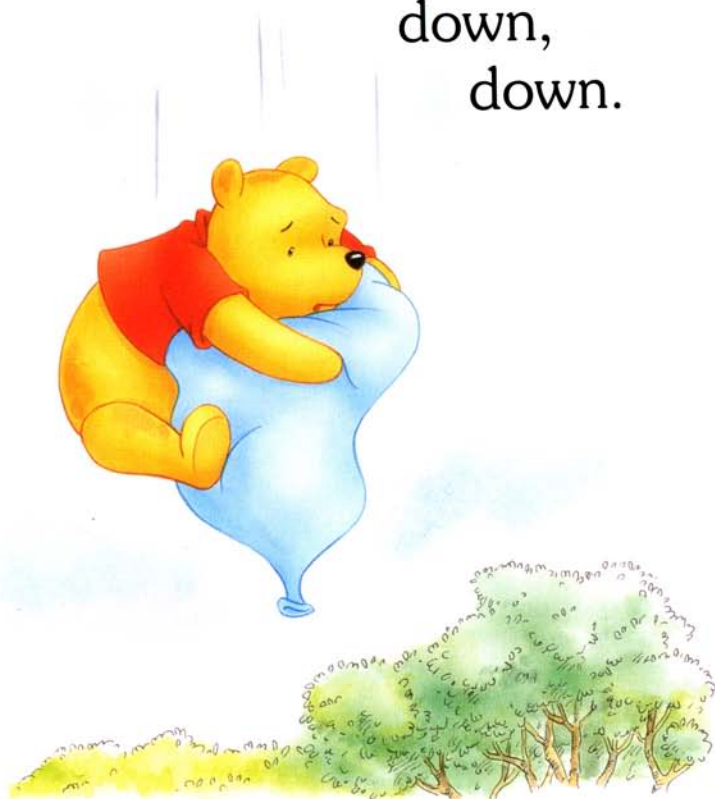


Whoosh!

About this book

The pictures in this book are designed to encourage children to talk about the story. After a discussion of the pictures, children can listen to an adult read the story or attempt to read it themselves. Unknown words can be worked out by looking at the beginning letter (what sound does this letter make?), and deciding which word would make sense.

Beginner readers need plenty of encouragement.
